Arkansas Team Earns Top Honors at National 4-H Forestry Invitational

Arkansas placed first among twelve states that competed in the 44th National 4-H Forestry Invitational from Sunday July 20 through Wednesday July 23. Teams from Mississippi and Virginia placed second and third, respectively. Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, North Carolina, Oklahoma, and Utah also competed in this year's Invitational.

The invitational was held at West Virginia University Jackson's Mill State 4-H Camp and Conference Center near Weston, West Virginia. The event is sponsored by Farm Credit, Green Diamond Resource Company, Society of American Foresters, The Jack Matthews Foundation, Virginia Cooperative Extension, West Virginia University Extension, Southern Regional Extension Forestry, Sustainable Forestry Initiative of Virginia and the Association of Natural Resource Extension Professionals,

While at the Invitational 4-H members competed for overall team and individual awards in several categories. Events included tree identification, tree measurement, compass and pacing, insect and disease identification, topographic map use, forest evaluation, the forestry bowl, and a written forestry exam.

The Arkansas team members were Nathaniel Huitt, Eli McDowell, Ariel Murphy, and Serena Grey. The team coach was Ty Huitt.

Arkansas's Serena Gray had the highest overall individual score in the contest. The second-place individual was Brandon Wallace from Virginia and the third-place high score was Nathaniel Huitt from Arkansas.

Mathew Grice of MS, Sarah Patton of NC and Eli McDowell of AR tied for individual high score in Tree ID. Dalton Allen of VA, Serena Gray of AR, and Helena Peterson of FL tied for the highest individual score on the Written Exam. Sarah Patton of NC, Ariel Murphy of AR, Taylor Stevens of AL, Nathaniel Huitt of AR, Brandon Wallace of VA, and Serena Gray of AR tied for individual high score in Forest Health. Brayden Tullos of MS earned the individual high score in Tree Measurement. Rowan Warezak of GA earned the individual high score in Compass & Pacing. Luke Rowan of VA earned the individual high score in Topography Maps. Team North Carolina won the Quiz Bowl competition and Team Mississippi earned the highest score in Forest Evaluation.

The Joe Yeager "Spirit of the Invitational" award winner was Madison Diggs of Oklahoma. This award recognizes an outstanding 4-H contestant at the Invitational who takes initiative, is enthusiastic, and is eager to lead academic and social situations.

The Tommy and Susan Futral Inspiration of the Invitational Award winner was Patrick Lemoine from Mississippi. He has taught youth for over 25 years and coached twelve 4-H forestry teams to the national forestry invitational over the years.

4-H is a youth education program operated by the Cooperative Extension Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, National Institute of Food and Agriculture and the state land grant universities.
